Background and Aim of the Workshop

The Democratic Republic of Timor-Leste is the newest independent country in the South-East Asian region officially becoming independent from Indonesia in May 2002. Although being one of the most disadvantaged countries in the region, Timor-Leste has shown significantly development over the past years.

This was not achieved without problems and challenges. Past elections were frequently accompanied by violence with accompanying casualties and have caused delays in downsizing and the eventual withdrawal of United Nations Integrated Mission in Timor-Leste (UNMIT).

Many see the processes and outcomes of the upcoming Parliamentary and Presidential elections planned in Timor-Leste in May & June 2012 as a testcase for the future development of the country as well as one of the benchmark of the efforts that have been put in by governmental, civil, nonprofit, private and foreign actors that have been working in and with the country.

Given this background, three young scholars studying at the University of Vienna will present their researches, views and experiences in Timor-Leste from their respective disciplinary area of studies. A short introductory presentation on Timor-Leste will be given to provide participants with the general political, social, economic and cultural background of the country.

The workshop will be moderated by an expert of South-East Asian studies and invite open and informal discussions among the participants.
